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
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Editorial Preface

We are pleased to inform you of the launching of the first JBA new edition in 2022. This volume represents the 18th year for JBA serving the readers and the journal continues to grow. In this volume, JBA provides an outlet for seven quality peer-reviewed scholarly articles on a variety of issues related to public administration studies. Since the beginning of this year, the manuscript submitted has increased in the number with a more diverse variety of administrative studies compared to the previous year. However, the JBA editorial board has accepted only the few that are both relevant to the journal readership and the quality approved by the editorial board.

This 18th JBA volume includes seven manuscripts. The manuscript written by Asropi et al. highlights the Flexible Work Arrangement (FWA) by government organizations, which emerged as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Meanwhile, Vishnu Juwono et al. in this issue comparing the implementation of tax audit policies in Indonesia and the Netherlands in the era of information disclosure. Furthermore, Griska Hedyanti et al. tried to analyze the economic structure of Pontianak City with an analysis of LQ, Typology Klassen, and Shifted Share to look at the growth of the base sector and the movement of economic structures. The fourth article in this issue is from Vidya Imanuari Pertiwi and Bagus Nuari Harmawan discussing the Tourism Management Issues and Its Relationship with The Sustainable Development Goals. Yulia Eryani et al. discussed competency development in an article entitled "The Effectiveness of the Functional Training for Pharmacy and Food Junior Expert Supervisors During Pandemic with Blended Learning Methods". In addition, using digital government evolution variables developed by Janowski (2015), Cathas Teguh Prakoso in his article tries to determine the stage of the Disdukcapil digital government in Kutai Kartanegara Regency. Last but not least, Afrizal Tjoetra et al. wrote an article that aims to identify and analyze the dynamics of the implementation of public information within the Aceh Government and the challenges of public management. All the manuscripts that have been submitted, provide a quite diverse nuance in the development of current public policy studies. Hopefully, it can be a reference for our loyal JBA readers.
